MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Hello to you all! I hope everyone enjoyed their Easter break.

As April draws to a close, we are starting to enjoy the cooler weather which will bring southern visitors to our Shire. For many of them it has become an annual pilgrimage. Please make them feel welcome!

The Einasleigh races were a resounding success and I'd like to take this opportunity to congratulate the race committee on putting together another great event.

The month of April saw me travel between Normanton, Townsville and Cairns to various meetings and functions, lobbying to secure economic development for our Shire, based around future roadworks (Hann Highway funding) and agricultural development.

It's good to see the Forsayth roadworks progressing. The CEO, the Engineer and myself will be travelling to Hughenden on the 4th May after the Oak Park community consultation meeting on the 3rd May to meet with our colleagues from Flinders Shire to discuss works programming for the Hann Highway. I travelled to Townsville on the 20th April to meet Minister Darren Chester for the media release announcing funding for the Hann Highway.

Background work on the Charleston Dam continues. While it may seem that nothing is happening with regards to the dam, there have been numerous issues to sort through (fish ladder etc) (We are almost there! Along with my grey hair!!)

Being a councilor is about planning for sustainable economic growth for our future. Our Councilors are under no illusions! We have a full understanding that the main driver for our region is the beef industry. But we need to diversify. Irrigated Agriculture and Tourism are areas that are within our natural landscape. The Gilbert River irrigation area has the potential to value add to the beef industry (feedlots etc) conditioning our cattle right through to slaughter and supporting our northern meatworks to open all year round, which will add to the Townsville economy, not to mention export opportunities.

Tourism is another of our economic drivers that our beautiful natural landscape opens itself up for. Over the last 6-8 months Council has been exploring avenues to take advantage of the accelerating tourism market in Northern Australia. GEOTOURISM fits like a hand in a glove to our Shire. We have the most amazing and incredible natural formations such as the Undara Lava tubes, Mt Surprise Gemfields, Tallaroo Hot Springs, Cobbold Gorge, Agate Creek, Sandstone conglomerates, The Gilberton Area, The Einasleigh Gorge and one of Australia's largest Goldfields just to mention a few of the better known ones.

Geotourism is one of the world's fastest growing phenomenon within the tourism sector. There are 130 Geoparks registered in the world but currently none in Australia. Council feel this is an amazing opportunity for Etheridge Shire to have the first registered Australian Geopark. We live in a changing world and we need to be progressive in adapting to change by not only taking advantage of opportunities as they arise but have the vision and vigour to create new opportunities.

I urge the community to attend the Geopark Project info night on the 2nd May at 6.30pm at the Golf Club in Georgetown. Angus Robinson will be available to answer any questions.

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

I'll be celebrating one month in my new role as Chief Executive Officer at Etheridge Shire and I would like to thank everyone for their warm welcome into this community. I will be kept busy over the next 3 years driving the Gilbert River Irrigation Scheme and GeoPark project in addition to the normal role of managing the Council to promote economic, efficient and effective management of public resources and excellence in service delivery.

I understand that there have been some concerns expressed about the GeoPark project - that its achievement may restrict or compromise existing economic activities. This is not correct: the GeoPark project aims to celebrate the mining, geology, grazing, agriculture and unique culture of the area.



GeoParks are designed to preserve significant examples of our geological environment, however this does not give UNESCO or the United Nations any power to impose restrictions on current or future mining activities, but it should enhance the tourism potential for the Shire.

The Geopark program is separate to and has different objectives to the World Heritage Convention and Global Network of Biosphere Reserves. A geopark will fall under the exclusive authority of the government in the country where it is situated: i.e. UNESCO will not impose any legal restrictions and the existing Federal, State and Local government laws will continue to be applied.

Council hopes that the Geopark designation will generate employment and economic activity linked to the area's special geology and beauty through increased visitation / tourism.



Operating Revenue



GILBERT RIVER IRRIGATION SCHEME

For some time, Council has been promoting the Gilbert River Irrigation Scheme (based on the Green Hills dam) to facilitate a more intensive agricultural development in the Shire.

Through the this proposal. Etheridge Shire sees an opportunity to progress orderly development of the Gilbert River area in accordance with Government policy and through funds currently accessing



available under the Federal Government's National Water Infrastructure Development Fund, the National Water Infrastructure Loan Facility and the Northern Australia Infrastructure Facility. The successful implementation of this project will promote employment opportunities, development of new agricultural industries and economic development generally.

Council has sought a State commitment to whole of Government coordination and facilitated support for this project including guidance to assist with meeting high environmental standards. Council is also considering the establishment of a Special Purpose Entity, wholly owned by the Shire (but with opportunity for individual and corporate membership) to be the Proponent.

Council intends to

- (i) partner regional stakeholders in developing a clearer and focused development vision for land and water resources within the catchment;
- (ii) determine appropriate equity principles for future allocation of water (e.g. allowance for one to two significant developments, framework for innovative pastoral intensification, strategic Indigenous reserves reviewed and supported, etc) over time;
- (iii) evaluate and set guidance for progression of preferred water development supply options (including impact standards); and
- (iv) establish an Area Vegetation Management Plan under the VMA to allow for orderly and streamlined tree clearing arrangements to be proactively developed.

With seven million dollars already spent through the CSIRO on studying the Gilbert, it is opportune to narrow the focus of interest to the single most viable alternative: the Green Hills dam (due to the level of documentation and access to suitable land (adjacent to the river, approximately 25 km immediately down-stream)). Sources from within the Federal Government have indicated that the latest a submission could be considered for the funding currently available is August this year.

Using the considerable CSIRO studies already completed, it is believed that a credible business case can be prepared and submitted within this timeframe based on the well proven Tasmanian Irrigation model which includes business case approvals being based on three conditions: viz. environmental and other approvals being achieved, private investment being raised through the sale of water entitlements and live tenders being in place to show that the infrastructure can be built within the budget provisions of the business case. Only after demonstrating the fulfilment of these conditions is funding released against the milestones of the Federal / State funding agreement.

Council will be advertising for a Project Manager to lead the establishment of the Gilbert River Irrigation Scheme and gain the necessary approvals for this project.

Project Description

The project is based on the Green Hills dam located on the Gilbert River with the full supply level at approximately 30 metres above the natural riverbed, giving an impoundment volume of approximately 300,000 ML and yielding 200,000ML for irrigation under an existing allocation. This is one of the dams proposed by the CSIRO studies conducted between 2010 and 2013. Delivery of the water is via the natural water course to one or more weirs on the Gilbert and a pump station on each weir delivering water via a pipeline approximately eight kilometres long to the boundaries of properties subdivided into lots of between 200 and 500 hectares. The lots will be subdivided from existing cattle stations where there is already approximately 12,000 hectares of cleared highly fertile land. It is estimated that fertile land together with water at 8 ML/ha could be offered at between \$4,500/ha and \$6,500/ha. It is proposed to raise between \$90 million and \$120 million of private sector investment in this way. Throughout Australia there is currently considerable investor interest in water if the right products are made available.

Electrical power for the disaggregated blocks and pump stations will be reticulated from a new substation. This land has already been mapped for soil quality and biodiversity. It is intended to apply for permits to clear another 3,000 or 4,000 hectares once an Area Vegetation Management Plan is in place.

As the Mareeba Dimbulah Water Supply System was established on tobacco in the mid-1950s but over time transitioned into high value agriculture and horticulture and yielded \$552M output in 2015 according to DAF, so it is proposed to use cotton as a host for Gilbert Irrigation. Based on this approach, preliminary economic modelling by Marsden Jacobs and Associates has shown that the proposal is economically viable yielding an economic NPV of between \$136 million and \$267 million (depending on capital in the range of \$220 million to \$360 million) based on 84.5% of the water going to cotton, the complementary crop and the remainder going to a mix of higher value yielding crops.

The establishment of a water trading framework will ensure that the water migrates to higher value production over time and the economic performance is higher than modelled.

UNESCO GLOBAL GEOPARKS



UNESCO Global Geoparks give international recognition for sites that promote the importance and significance of protecting the Earth's geodiversity through actively engaging with the local communities.

What is a Global Geopark?

A Global Geopark is a unified area with geological heritage of international significance. Geoparks use that heritage to promote awareness of key issues facing society in the context of the dynamic planet we all live on.

Many Geoparks promote awareness of geological hazards, including volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis and many help prepare disaster mitigation strategies among local communities. Geoparks hold records of past climate change and are educators on current climate change as well as adopting a best practise approach



to utilising renewable energy and employing the best standards of "green tourism."

Geoparks also inform about the sustainable use and need for natural resources, whether they are mined, quarried or harnessed from the surrounding environment while at the same time promoting respect for the environment and the integrity of the landscape. Geoparks are not a legislative designation though the key heritage sites within a geopark should be protected under local, regional or national legislation as appropriate.




Is a Geopark just about Geology?

No! While a geopark must demonstrate geological heritage of international significance, the purpose of a geopark is to explore, develop and celebrate the links between that geological heritage and all other aspects of the area's natural, cultural and intangible heritages.

It is about reconnecting human society at all levels to the planet we all call home and to celebrate how our planet and it's 4,600 million year long history has shaped every aspect of our lives and our societies.

Geotourism incorporating all types of 'Nature Based' and 'Cultural' tourism:



<u>Understanding how Environmental, Natural & Cultural Heritages are included in the Geopark is as</u> easy as A, B, C:

- A. Abiotic non-living aspects such as the climate & geology e.g. landscape and landforms: *GEODIVERSITY*
- B. Biotic the living parts eg. fauna (animals) and flora (plants): BIODIVERSITY
- C. Cultural past & present, non-living & built

Key Factors of Geopark Development in Australia (2016):

- Geopark development needs to be state/local government agency initiated and supported.
- ➤ A high level of community engagement is essential to meet UNESCO requirements.
- ➤ The key driver of geopark development must be focused on regional development i.e. jobs and growth.
- > The approval of Government Geological Surveys for individual projects is an absolute necessity.
- Australian Government approval for UNESCO nomination may well be achieved if state/territory government 'ownership'endorsement and funding is clearly established.

Council has started the process of eradication in our townships, parks and vacant land.


Unfortunately seeds are long-lasting in the ground so you may need to stay vigilant for as long as seven years to get all that were accidentally introduced into your garden.

HOUSEHOLD WASTE COLLECTION



Again Council seeks your support and help in the continued successful collection of household waste in Georgetown. Residents can help in the ongoing efficient collection of household waste through following a few simple rules:

- Don't over fill your bin as this causes problems in emptying bins with truck mechanism



- Bin lids should be closed properly at all times
- Break up or squash bulky items such as cardboard boxes before putting in bin
- Bins must be placed at kerb or edge of bitumen roadway for collection

GEORGETOWN & FORSAYTH



BASE LEVEL 0 RESTRICTIONS

<u>Base Level 0</u> – Restrictions will now apply to all water connections within the Georgetown and Forsayth Water Supply Scheme.

Notice is hereby given of water restrictions in accordance with the Local Government Act and the Water Act 2002 Section 388 (1) Restricting Water Supply.

- 1. No sprinklers on Mondays.



Speech Pathology Services:

Atherton Hospital Speech Pathology Department provides services to rural and remote sites. A Speech Pathologist is a person who is qualified to assess and treat people who have difficulties communicating and/or eating and drinking. Speech Pathologists provide services to both adults and children and can offer assessment and therapy via video-conference formally known as 'telehealth'. If you would like to make a referral or discuss a referral, please contact Atherton hospital Speech pathology on 40910256,

Eligible Patients

Adults requiring speech pathology services generally had good communication skills in the past, until an illness or incident. If you tick one or more of the boxes below, please consider a referral to a Speech Pathologist.

Stroke – Rehabilitation for difficulties with understanding, word-finding, social skills, expressive language, grammar, fluency of speech and muscular weakness as well as eating and drinking.

Suspected Transient Ischaemic Attack affecting the patient's ability to communicate or swallow.

Degenerative muscular or neurological conditions such as Parkinson's, Muscular Dystrophy or Myasthenia Gravis; causing impaired cognitive function and/or language skills, or difficulties with speech clarity, volume, or feeding skills.

Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injuries – motor vehicle accident, farm accident, assault, falls, etc. causing language, cognition, feeding and/or memory impairments etc.

Head and neck surgery – to provide support to individuals and carers for issues related to speech, voice and feeding as a result of surgery

Head and Neck Cancer – to provide support for individuals before, during and post treatment for issues related to feeding, voice and speech, including alternative communication methods and stoma and/or voice prostheses management post-laryngectomy.

Dementia – for support regarding word finding, orientation & memory, etc

Dysphagia – many people have swallowing difficulties particularly the elderly, people with advanced respiratory conditions or those recovering from illness, injury or incidents such as a CVA. Some indicators are: history of chest infections, weight loss, coughing or poor feeding skills.

Voice disorders or transsexual voice – frequent voice loss and issues related to volume or quality, e.g. hoarse, breathy, tight etc. Professional voice users and individuals who use their voices frequently are often vulnerable to voice issues, (e.g. teachers, auctioneers, receptionist, etc). Also, persons transitioning from a male to female identity.

Hearing loss causing communication difficulty.

Other communication difficulties after Brain Damage – inflammatory (e.g. meningitis), toxic or metabolic diseases (e.g. deficiencies or drug toxicity), etc.

Children develop the skills for successful communication gradually, particularly in the first 5 years. If a child is not performing as you would expect for their age or you tick any of the following, please refer to a speech pathologist for assessment and intervention.

Does the child (compared to other children of the same age):

- Have difficulty following instructions or need frequent repetitions of questions
- Use a limited range of different words
- Speak only in single words or very short sentences after age 2
- Use immature grammar or have poorly formed sentences
- Have difficulty maintaining a conversation
- Poor social skills, such as taking turns, listening, greetings, etc.
- Sound different to other children or is difficult to understand
- Have a hoarse, husky, whispery or unusual voice or have vocal nodules
- Have severe communication impairment needing alternative communication methods
- Stutter or not speak fluently
- Have poor feeding skills, failure to thrive or eat only a limited range of food

Outreach Physio Therapy:

The outreach physiotherapist visits Mt Surprise, Einasleigh, Forsayth, Georgetown and Croydon on a 3 day trip about 5 times each year. The next visit is 27 Feb – 1 March and the physiotherapist, Lou Gobius will be travelling with the Dietitian, Kelly Oliver.

As a general overview, physiotherapists provide individual assessment and management for a range of conditions including:

- musculoskeletal/sports injuries including fractures and muscle/joint pain
- balance/mobility difficulties
- recovery post surgery
- respiratory conditions including pneumonia, COPD
- paediatric development
- neurological conditions such as stroke, nerve damage, spinal injury
- burns

Physiotherapy treatment generally consists of
Rehabilitation and facilitation of correct movement patterns
Exercise prescription
Manual therapy
Patient and carer education
Mobility aid prescription
Injury prevention
Pain relief
Strapping/taping

If you think you may require physiotherapy intervention, please discuss it with the visiting RFDS Doctor or your local Clinic nurse and if indicated, they will send a referral to us to follow up at our next visit. There is also Telehealth available where consults can take place via videoconferencing as appropriate.



People generally don't really understand why or how other people become addicted to drugs. Often they mistakenly think that those who use drugs lack moral principles or willpower and that they could stop their drug use simply by choosing to, by using their "will power". In reality, drug addiction is a complex disease, and quitting always takes more than good intentions or a strong will. Drugs actually change the brain in ways that make quitting hard, even for those who want to. Sometimes when people are a long way into drug addiction a drug induced paranoia which is characterised by significant distortions of reality, can present and these will impede a person's ability to make a full recovery. Fortunately, researchers know more than ever about how drugs affect the brain and have found treatments that can help people recover from drug addiction and lead productive lives.

What Is drug addiction? Addiction is a chronic disease characterized by people looking for and using the desired drug, and that need is compulsive, and difficult to control, despite harmful consequences. The initial decision to take drugs is voluntary for most people, and may arise as a consequence of curiosity and/or experimentation which often soon descends into repeated drug use which then can lead to brain changes that challenge an addicted person's self-control and interfere with their ability to resist intense urges to take drugs. These brain changes can be persistent, which is why drug addiction is considered a "relapsing" disease—people in recovery from drug use disorders are at increased risk for returning to drug use even after years of not taking the drug.

What happens to the brain when a person takes drugs? Most drugs affect the brain's "reward circuit" by flooding it with the chemical messenger dopamine. This reward system controls the body's ability to feel pleasure and motivates a person to repeat behaviours needed to thrive, such as eating and spending time with loved ones. This overstimulation of the reward circuit causes the intensely pleasurable "high" that can lead people to take a drug again and again.

As a person continues to use drugs, the brain adjusts to the excess dopamine by making less of it and/or reducing the ability of cells in the reward circuit to respond to it. This reduces the high that the person feels compared to the high they felt when first taking the drug—an effect known as tolerance. As tolerance increases there is a need usually to take more of the drug as they try to achieve the same dopamine high. It can also cause them to experience anhedonia (loss of pleasure) as they then get less pleasure from other things they once enjoyed, like food or social activities.

Long-term use also causes changes in other brain chemical systems and circuits as well, affecting functions that include:

•Learning	•Judgment
Decision-making	•Stress
•Memory	•Behaviour

Despite being aware of these harmful outcomes, many people who use drugs continue to take them, which is the nature of addiction. Judgement and decision-making abilities are significantly impaired.

Why do some people become addicted to drugs while others don't? No one factor can predict if a person will become addicted to drugs. A combination of factors influences risk for addiction. The more risk factors a person has, the greater the chance that taking drugs can lead to addiction. For example:

- **Biology**. The genes that people are born with account for about half of a person's risk for addiction. Gender, ethnicity, and the presence of other mental disorders may also influence risk for drug use and addiction.
- Environment. A person's environment includes many different influences, from family and friends to economic status and general quality of life. Factors such as peer pressure, physical and sexual abuse, early exposure to drugs, stress, and parental guidance can greatly affect a person's likelihood of drug use and addiction.
- Development. Genetic and environmental factors interact with critical developmental stages in a
 person's life to affect addiction risk. Although taking drugs at any age can lead to addiction, the
 earlier that drug use begins, the more likely it will progress to addiction. This is particularly
 problematic for teens. Because areas in their brains that control decision-making, judgment, and
 self-control are still developing, teens may be especially prone to risky behaviours, including trying
 drugs.

Can drug addiction be cured or prevented? As with most other chronic diseases, such as diabetes, asthma, or heart disease, treatment for drug addiction generally isn't a cure. However, addiction is treatable and can be successfully managed. People who are recovering from an addiction will be at risk for relapse for years and possibly for their whole lives. Research shows that combining addiction treatment medicines with behavioural therapy ensures the best chance of success for most patients. Treatment approaches tailored to each patient's drug use patterns and any co-occurring medical, mental, and social problems can lead to continued recovery.

More good news is that drug use and addiction are preventable. Although personal events and cultural factors affect drug use trends, when young people view drug use as harmful, they tend to decrease their drug taking. Therefore, education and outreach are key in helping people understand the possible risks of drug use. Teachers, parents, and health care providers have crucial roles in educating young people and preventing drug use and addiction.

Points to Remember

- Drug addiction is a chronic disease characterized by drug seeking and use that is compulsive, or difficult to control, despite harmful consequences.
- Brain changes that occur over time with drug use challenge an addicted person's self-control and interfere with their ability to resist intense urges to take drugs. This is why drug addiction is also a relapsing disease.
- Relapse is the return to drug use after an attempt to stop. Relapse indicates the need for more or different treatment.
- Most drugs affect the brain's reward circuit by flooding it with the chemical messenger dopamine.
 This overstimulation of the reward circuit causes the intensely pleasurable "high" that leads people to take a drug again and again.
- Over time, the brain adjusts to the excess dopamine, which reduces the high that the person feels
 compared to the high they felt when first taking the drug—an effect known as tolerance. They
 might take more of the drug, trying to achieve the same dopamine high.
- No single factor can predict whether a person will become addicted to drugs. A combination of genetic, environmental, and developmental factors influences risk for addiction. The more risk factors a person has, the greater the chance that taking drugs can lead to addiction.
- Drug addiction is treatable and can be successfully managed.
- More good news is that drug use and addiction are preventable. Teachers, parents, and health
 care providers have crucial roles in educating young people and preventing drug use and
 addiction.

COPPER'S CORNER

It is time for yet another reminder about the use of unregistered motorbikes, quads and UTV's on roads and road related areas with 3 local residents receiving fines for not obeying the law in recent times. In Queensland, a road or road related areas is defined as including all land in allocated road reserves which is in essence, from fence to fence. This means that all road rules apply to all vehicles travelling in this area – not necessarily just on the "black stuff". I understand the need to move motorbikes out of town and having to trailer them is somewhat inconvenient.

IF A CRIME'S HAPPENING RIGHT NOW, CALL TRIPLE ZERO (000).

IF *NOT*, THINK POLICELINK. CALL 131 444.

For this reason, I relax my expectations to allow unregistered bikes to be ridden on footpaths to get out of town **providing they are pushed across the roads and do not annoy the local residents**. New laws prohibit children under 8 years from being passengers on quad bikes and <u>ALL</u> riders are now required to wear helmets when riding on roads (if the vehicle is registered), Road related areas (footpaths / side of road etc.) and on stock routes. Not wearing a helmet will cost you \$365.00 and 3 demerit points on your licence.

So in brief, please stop the practice of riding unregistered / uninsured motorbikes on the road. And if you are riding- put a helmet on. I have spoken on this topic for over 2 years now, and sadly people are still taking liberties believing that the law does not apply to them. If anyone is found not following these simple laws, they will face fines up to nearly \$1000.00 and possible seizure of the motorbike. If anyone has any questions about this, please give me a call or see me when I'm out and about.

Finally a reminder that I do drivers licencing and weapons licencing by appointment only as this avoids me sitting in the office if nobody is coming in. If the office is unattended, leave a message and I will return your call to make an appointment.

Homemade Sausage Rolls

INGREDIENTS

- 1 kg steak (beef) minced
- 1 onion diced
- 420 g mixed vegetables
- 1 cup dried breadcrumbs
- 3 egg
- 1/3 cup teriyaki marinade
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp spice mix
- 1 pinch seasoning *to taste
- 1 tsp curry powder
- 6 sheets puff pastry
- 2 tbs Italian mixed herbs *to decorate

METHOD

- 1. Blend eggs, onion, vegetables, marinade, and all spices together then add the mince. Mix thoroughly and add enough breadcrumbs to soak up the liquid in the mix.
- 2. Roll out the mixture as thick or thin as desired.
- 3. Cover sausage mixture with pastry and cut each roll into 4 party sausage rolls, or as desired.
- 4. Place on trays and brush with a little water. Sprinkle each sausage roll with mixed herbs or Italian herbs.
- 5. Cook at 180C for approximately 20 minutes or until golden brown

NOTES

After the sausage rolls have cooled they can be frozen. If you have any mince mixture left over try making a few small meatballs and serve with sweet chilli sauce.










The Church gathers weekly on Sundays

These get togethers happen weekly where we read the Bible, consider what it says, explore the meaning and discuss it with each other. Anyone is welcome to join.




